No stranger to Greenwich causes, Caralyn has been involved in the Garden Education Center, the YWCA, Glenville School PTA and has served on the Board of United Way and as President of GADC. Go Wild! the GLT’s annual family field day is regarded as one of the best family events in Greenwich.
